It is a great pleasure of our editorial team to interview one of our outstanding alumni, Ms Connie, Lau Yin-hing on 6 May, 2010. Being the Chief Executive of Consumer Council, Ms Lau has made enormous contributions to our society concerning the beneficiary of all the consumers in Hong Kong. The interview was inspiring and our team has learnt a lot from her experiences.

I would like to express my hearty thanks to my alma mater for inviting me to this good and valuable sharing session. I must say, modestly, I'm not the most successful as there are so many great alumni that have been doing a good job and giving good contribution to society. But I'm happy and glad to be interviewed by Lai Chack students and I look forward to the publication of the second issue of Spotlight. To be honest,

you may not know it, the day I received the first issue, I was having dinner with other alumni and we were so touched by the publication of an English magazine by our alma mater, a traditional Chinese school. So, in the restaurant, I wrote a letter of congratulation to the school supervisor and the school principal immediately, for the achievement of our young schoolmates. The letter was written by me in Chinese and then, one of my classmates wrote one too. He contributed his ideas in English and he sent all our comments to the school later. We were really so happy for our schoolmates' achievement.

Ms Lau, how do you usually feel when you visit your mother school, Lai Chack Middle School?

When I visit Lai Chack, I usually recall the good memory when I was young. For example, when I go to the basketball court or the kitchen where we had domestic lessons, memories of the good old days will be recalled. Also, I must tell you this, treasure the time you have in school because later on, you won't have it. I remember earlier I accompanied my mother back to the school to give scholarships to the very outstanding students; we were waiting for the ceremony to begin and so we went around the school and we talked happily about our memories as students at Lai Chack.

What was the most impressive thing or event when you studied in Lai Chack?

Those many things I can recall are good things. One of the most memorable things would be, well I don't mean to boost myself or to publicize myself, the moment when I was told that I got No.1 in the Joint College Entrance Examination in Taiwan.

Wow! That's great! We haven't heard of this examination. Could you tell us more about that?

It was an examination conducted in Hong Kong and an entrance examination for students going to universities in Taiwan, including National Taiwan University, National Taiwan Normal University, National Cheng Kung University and others. There were four exam groups, A, B, C, D. I took the exam group C and I got 471 marks, the highest score throughout Asia. If I may say, actually there are so many things worthy of talking, but if you ask me to pick one of them, this is the one.

Wow! That's amazing! How did you feel?

I was 17 that year and I was interviewed by Hong Kong Times. Actually I never thought that it was something special but suddenly, as a young student, I had never been exposed to such a high level exam, so I was very happy.

When I look back now, it was just an ordinary thing because in every exam, you always have one that outperforms the others.

Your family must be very proud of you!

Yes, I remember my family was very happy. My father is very experienced in Chinese calligraphy. He even wrote me a Chinese adage in calligraphy expressing how my achievement had given them pride as parents.

Well, to be honest to every one of you, to be good is a reward to your parents and a reward to your family. It's not just materials that count. Bringing them to 'yum cha' is good. Bringing them to shop is excellent. However, I think people highlight more on materials rather than spiritual reward to parents. I can imagine how happy my parents were at that time knowing that their daughter had achieved such results. You should also adopt this approach. Whenever you think about yourself and your behaviour, think about your family first. I have 5 siblings and I am the second one. But at that time, I was the eldest one. Why? My elder brother had gone to America, so I was the Big



Sister. To take up that role as the eldest sister, I think it is very important that you need to set a role model.

As a student, what kind of attitudes should we have towards studies? Is it all about public examination or is the learning process important too?

I think the learning process is more important than anything because the school doesn't only provide you with knowledge or examination skills. I think that the school gives you knowledge and also develops your character as well as communication skills so that when you go to college, you will be well equipped. For learning, I truly emphasize that you must pay one hundred per cent attention in the classroom. Actually, I was not a diligent student. I used to be lazy too. When I was a student, I liked to watch the TV programme 'Enjoy Yourself Tonight'. I think we should never daydream. Why? This is because we are now talking about cost effectiveness. If you pay enough attention in class, you will get double results by half the effort because you will have a picture about the lesson. Then, you will save the time spent on revision and you will still have time to watch 'Enjoy Yourself Tonight'.

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Ms Lau is an amiable lady. When we had the interview with her, I thought we were just like a family from Lai Chack and that was a great experience for us to know more about our alumni. After the interview, I know that many alumni still miss our school although they have left school. I'm quite sure that after my graduation, I will also treasure my school life at Lai Chack. Finally, I'm very proud of being a student in Lai Chack and I will set my goal to be a contributive person of society.



It is my pleasure to interview Ms Lau. It was a good experience to me. At first, I thought it was a big challenge. I was afraid of speaking English. However, it was an opportunity to build up self-confidence. Moreover, teachers had given us great support. When I interviewed Ms Lau, I felt nervous. Fortunately, Ms Lau was extremely friendly and she shared her learning experience with us. We had a handmade photo album and a thank-you card for her. She was so surprised. Background

The English Department has joined a QEF funded professional development and research project titled *Promoting New Literacies in Hong Kong Schools*. The research project is conducted by Dr Matthew Clarke (principal investigator), Ms Margaret Lo, Dr Jasmine Luk and Dr Svetlana Chigaeva (co-investigators) from the Faculty of Education, The University of Hong Kong. The aims are to support teachers' teaching strategies, enhance students' writing and reading experiences, develop students' ability to work with new technology and create room for students to apply technology in literacy activities. Along with the other 11 participating schools, our project has a focus on teaching new literacies through short stories as a bridging component from junior curriculum to NSS electives.

Two S1 classes and one S3 class took part in the project. In the new literacies classes, students were engaged in reading and analyzing short stories. They were exposed to essential reading strategies to deconstruct short stories, the elements that contribute to making a good story and a selfevaluation tool in assessing their writing and presentation skills. In the process of reading short stories, students cultivated an interest in performing a story using storytelling techniques together with their imagination and creativity.

Project Learning



Standardized Testing: Fair Enough to Identify Elites

Hong Kong is famous for being a shopping and cuisine paradise. Many tourists flock to Hong Kong every year. Yet, the city is also well-known for its examination-oriented education system. Quite a lot of people doubt Hong Kong relies too much on standardized tests, such as HKCEE and HKALE. Here are the arguments for and against standardized testing.

Hong Kong was governed by the British Government for nearly two centuries. HKCEE, HKALE and HKDSE are the terms widely adopted by the public to refer to the standardized assessments. These assessments have been commonly referred to as "public examinations" which are administered and conducted under standardized or controlled conditions that specify where, when, how and how long candidates may respond to the questions set based on the official curriculum guide outlined by the Education Bureau. Some people believe that public examination is a fair system to categorize students according to the grades they obtain from various academic domains. The reason is that all of the participants of the standardized test have not seen the paper before and everyone is given the same period of time to do the preparations. More than that, candidates are not allowed to write their names on the paper. Markers, therefore, can hardly mark or recognize the work of their own students. It is another evidence to prove that the test goes in a just way. In many nations, especially in Europe, public examinations are prevalent to universities or colleges. There is no doubt that European countries used to dominate worldwide in the past decades. If people disbelieve the effectiveness and fairness of standardized test in eliciting pools of talent, they would have criticized the education systems of these well-developed nations where Churchill, Newton and Nobel received education.

Standardized testing seems to be a justified way to examine how much has been learnt and mastered by

learners. However, there are parties who hold views against standardized testing. These people claim standardized tests have posed too much stress on teenagers, and life should not just be determined by a one-off assessment. The government always emphasizes the process is far more important than the result. More investments on helping students to develop generic skills and other talents are expected. Students, elite or not, may pay full effort in an attempt to achieve satisfactory performance in the highly competitive one-off standardized testing. In some extreme cases, students who are too stressed out may even commit suicide as a way out from stress. How tragic it is! On the contrary, if students are too relaxed in face of public examinations, the results they gain may be catastrophic and they would have nothing to do except waiting for an opportunity to repeat or become a part of the working population. Time is the most precious asset for teenagers. It is not worth it to spend all year round in preparation for public examinations with other aspects of an all-rounded development neglected.

Having considered the pros and cons, I will say I am a proponent of standardized testing. Although tension, stress and emotional problems may inevitably emerge with

standardized tests, there is no other way which is fairer than having 20,000 candidates do the same paper at the same time. In addition, through striking for excellence in the "war-liked" exam, we could test our patience like running in a marathon. Do think before you have a polar view against public examinations!
